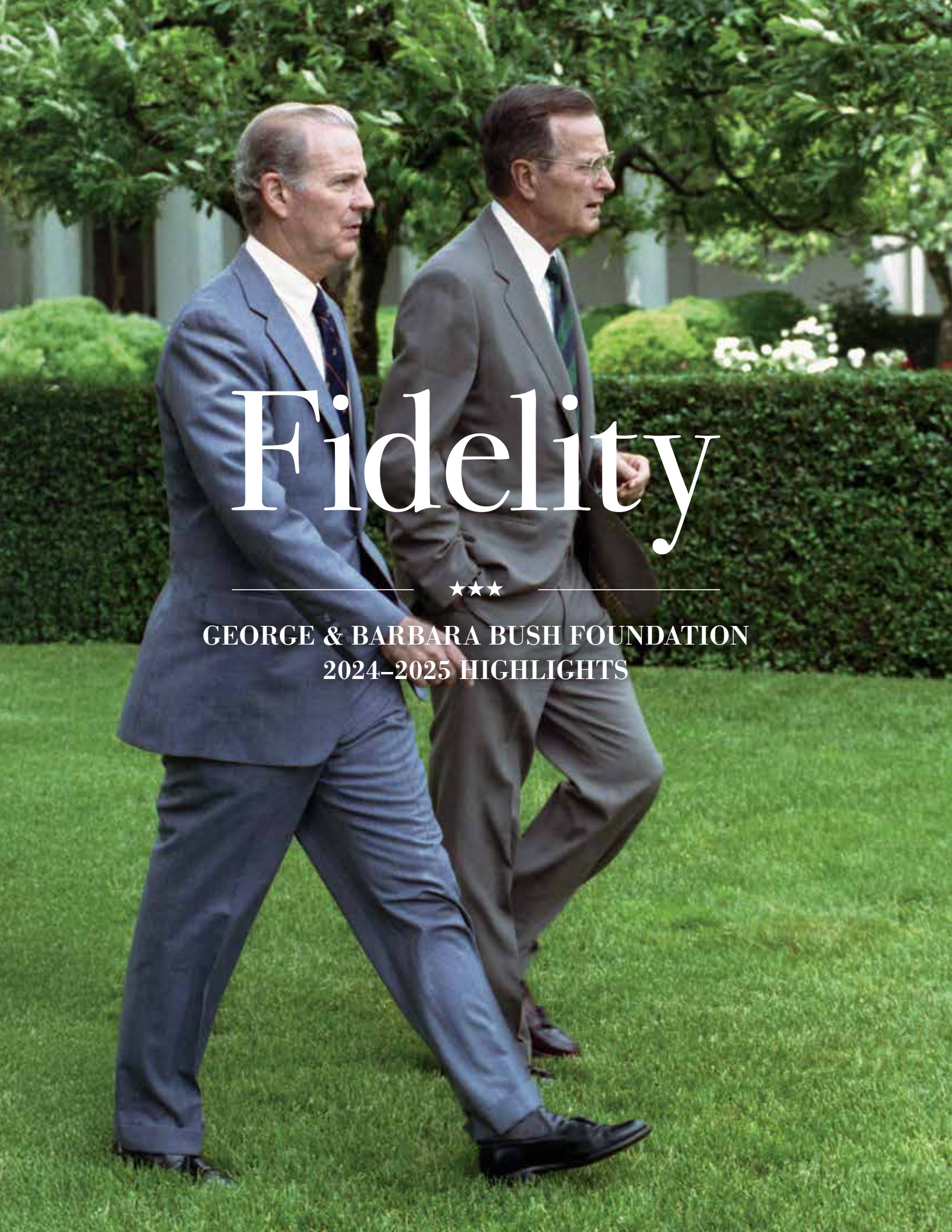

NAMING CEREMONY AND DEDICATION



On September 25, 2025, the George & Barbara Bush Foundation proudly hosted the Naming Ceremony and Dedication of the James A. Baker, III Pavilion at the George H.W. Bush Presidential Center in College Station, Texas. The event honored one of the most influential statesmen in American history and President George H.W. Bush's closest friend and most trusted advisor, Secretary James A. Baker, III.

The ceremony began with a stirring presentation of colors by the Texas A&M Corps of Cadets Ross Volunteers and a powerful rendition of the national anthem performed by the Texas A&M Singing Cadets, under the direction of David Kipp. An interfaith prayer was delivered by

Reverend Kathleene Card, setting a respectful and solemn tone for the morning's events.

Guests in attendance included members of the Bush and Baker families, Bush Foundation board members, Texas A&M University leadership, former cabinet members, longtime

friends, and community leaders. In a moment of symbolic celebration, Secretary Andrew H. Card, Jr., Governor Jeb Bush, and Foundation CEO Alice Gonzalez Yates unveiled the new Pavilion and exhibit with a dramatic curtain drop.

Speakers for the ceremony included Governor Jeb Bush, Fred McClure—Chief Community Engagement Officer at Texas A&M and Bush Foundation board member—and Secretary James A. Baker, III himself. Each reflected on Baker’s decades of service, his leadership, and the extraordinary friendship he shared with President Bush. Governor Bush spoke warmly and sincerely, calling Secretary Baker “the greatest living American,” while emphasizing that he was also his father’s best friend—a bond that spanned more than 60 years, beginning on a Houston tennis court and extending through their collaborative political careers.

Fred McClure highlighted the Pavilion’s dual role: as a tribute to Baker’s legacy and a space for the public to engage with American history. The structure houses historic exhibits including Marine One—the presidential helicopter—and the iconic

Union Pacific 4141 Locomotive, both symbols of President Bush’s legacy and now of Baker’s as well.

Secretary Baker reflected on his lifelong partnership with President Bush, remarking, “As we look back at his legacy, we can honestly say he was the best one-term president in U.S. history. And one of the very best presidents of all time. His adroit management of U.S. foreign policy at the end of the Cold War is among the pantheons of great diplomacy.”

A heartfelt tribute letter from President George W. Bush was also shared, honoring Secretary Baker as “one of the finest, most skilled statesmen to ever work in our Nation’s capital,” and—most importantly—as a loyal friend to his father.

Yates concluded the program with a quote from Trevor Rees-Jones, a steadfast supporter of the Foundation and close friend of Secretary Baker, reflecting on the profound partnership between Bush and Baker: “Friendship forged their strength. Trust guided their leadership. Together President Bush and Secretary Baker changed the world.”

Thanks to the vision and leadership of Secretary Andrew H. Card, Jr., the James A. Baker, III Pavilion now stands as a lasting symbol of public service, friendship, and principled leadership. It will serve as a vibrant hub for educational programs and civic engagement, continuing the legacy of two extraordinary American leaders. ★

THE HIGHEST CALLING: CONVERSATIONS ON THE AMERICAN PRESIDENCY BY DAVID RUBENSTEIN

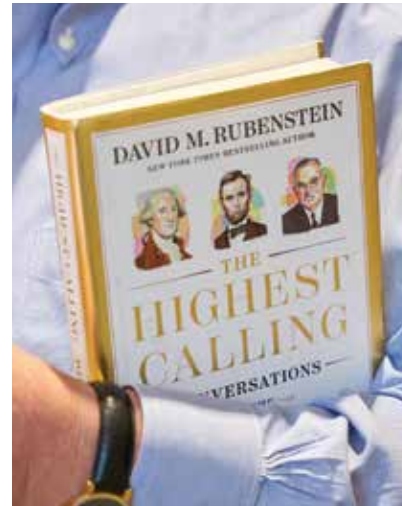
SEPTEMBER 24, 2025

On September 24, 2025, the George & Barbara Bush Foundation hosted *An Evening with David Rubenstein* at the Annenberg Presidential Conference Center. The engaging program featured a thought-provoking conversation between philanthropist,

businessman, and bestselling author David Rubenstein and Jeb Bush, the 43rd Governor of Florida, centered on Rubenstein's latest book, *The Highest Calling: Conversations on the American Presidency*.

Alice Gonzalez Yates welcomed a full house that included members of the Bush family, students, former ambassadors, Bush administration alumni, and Bryan/College Station community members. She then introduced the evening's distinguished speakers.

Governor Bush opened by reflecting on the values of service and humility instilled by his parents—values echoed throughout Rubenstein's book. Their conversation explored



civic duty, presidential leadership, and legacy through the lens of Rubenstein's interviews with modern presidents and his own experiences, including his time as a young policy aide to President Jimmy Carter. Rubenstein recounted a humorous story about gaining

White House access before his security clearance had been approved, and spoke about President Carter's influential post-presidency, which helped redefine the modern role of former presidents.

The evening also included personal anecdotes, including Rubenstein's friendship with President George H.W. Bush, which began through his close work with Secretary James A. Baker, III. He fondly recalled traveling with President Bush in his post-presidency and remarked on his humility and unwavering sense of purpose.

The conversation concluded with a lively exchange about baseball—Rubenstein owns the Baltimore Orioles—and a review of Rubenstein's extraordinary career. Governor Bush noted, "David, you're one of the youngest 75-year-olds I have ever met," highlighting his leadership across philanthropy, education, and the arts.

The event closed with guests lining the lobby for a signed copy of *The Highest Calling*, capping off an evening that underscored the enduring importance of service, legacy, and leadership—values long championed by President and Mrs. Bush. ★

2025 McLANE LEADERSHIP IN BUSINESS AWARD HONORING PETE McCANNA

SEPTEMBER 4, 2025

The McLane Leadership in Business Award has long reflected President George H.W. Bush's belief in integrity, vision, and service to others. On September 4, 2025, the tradition continued as the Mosbacher Institute for Trade, Economics, and Public Policy at the Bush School of Government and Public Service, in partnership with the George & Barbara Bush Foundation, honored Pete McCanna, CEO of Baylor Scott & White Health (BSW), for

his transformative leadership and commitment to advancing healthcare access.

The evening began with welcoming remarks from Bush School Dean John B. Sherman, followed by a tribute video underscoring the award's deep ties to President George H.W. Bush's legacy of service, integrity, and leadership. Alice Gonzalez Yates introduced the program, emphasizing the Foundation's continued mission to honor those who lead with purpose and vision.

In the spirit of President Bush's dedication to education and civic engagement, McCanna met earlier in the day with students from the Bush School, the School of Public Health, and the Department of Economics. The discussion covered healthcare access, policy innovation, and career





development—offering students a firsthand look at the future of healthcare leadership.

During the ceremony, McCanna sat down with Mosbacher Institute Director Dr. Raymond Robertson for a wide-ranging conversation tracing his path from an English degree at the University of Michigan to executive leadership in one of the nation’s largest not-for-profit health systems. He spoke about the personal influences that shaped his values and the importance of using technology—especially AI—to improve patient care and expand access.

McCanna’s remarks reflected the values the Bush Foundation holds dear: purpose-driven

service, empathy, and innovation in the public interest. When asked where he finds hope, he credited the mission-focused professionals at BSW and called for bold steps to expand health insurance coverage for underserved communities.

The ceremony concluded with the presentation of the McLane award by Drayton McLane Jr., chairman of the McLane Group, who praised McCanna’s leadership and selflessness. With nearly 40 years of experience in the healthcare industry, Pete McCanna was celebrated by family, colleagues, and members of the Bush School and Texas A&M community. ★

BARBARA BUSH STAMP UNVEILING

MAY 8, 2025

The U.S. Postal Service unveiled the commemorative stamp honoring Mrs. Bush’s 100th birthday in May at a White House event hosted by First Lady Melania Trump. The stamp features Mrs. Bush’s official 2005 White House portrait by artist Chas Fagan.

Judy de Torok, Vice President of Corporate Affairs at the Postal Service, introduced the stamp by highlighting key accolades and influential moments from Mrs. Bush’s life. De Torok said, “She spoke her mind,



laughed at herself, and stayed grounded, even as history unfolded around her.”

Following the unveiling, Alice Gonzalez Yates thanked the Postal Service for honoring Mrs. Bush’s centennial year in such a momentous manner, before introducing Doro Bush Koch, Barbara Bush’s daughter. Taking the podium, Koch told the audience, “The stamp perfectly captures mom’s poise and dignity.” Koch recounted how a young Barbara met the only man she would ever kiss at a school dance, and how, two years later she was engaged to George Bush. Little did she know the adventures ahead,” Koch said, with tears in her eyes. “Mom told her staff she wanted to do something every day to help others, so that’s what she did.” Acknowledging that it was unlikely her mother ever imagined seeing herself on a postage stamp, Koch shared her family’s pride and honor at the special tribute.

First Lady Melania Trump concluded the event with heartfelt remarks. “Barbara’s unwavering conviction, dignity, and deep loyalty to her loved ones have left an undeniable mark on our hearts and history,” she said. Reflecting on Barbara Bush’s indelible influence, Trump recalled her iconic Wellesley College commencement address, noting, “Her message, which emphasized the importance of family and personal integrity, encouraged women to carve their own paths in life.”

She ended with a call to carry Barbara Bush’s legacy forward. “May this tribute inspire us to lead with compassion, act with strength, and uphold the values that direct us all toward meaningful existence.” ★

BARBARA BUSH STAMP FIRST DAY OF ISSUE CEREMONY

JUNE 10, 2025

On June 10, 2025, President George W. Bush and Mrs. Laura Bush led a moving First Day of Issue ceremony in Kennebunkport, Maine. Family, friends, and admirers gathered at Ganny’s Garden to celebrate Mrs. Bush’s enduring legacy of literacy, compassion, and public service.

Acting Postmaster General Doug Tulino invited the crowd to remember the significance of Mrs. Bush’s connection with the U.S. Postal Service, through



letters sent to President George H.W. Bush during World War II, loving notes penned to her children, and the countless responses she returned to members of the public. Of the hundreds of thousands of letters she received a year, she made a point to answer many. Tulino emphasized that these letters were the “bridge between one American and another, a personal connection with the public she served all her life.”

Tulino also shared a memorable story from 1990, when Mrs. Bush jokingly referred to *The Simpsons* as “the dumbest thing” she’d ever seen during an interview. Shortly afterward, she received a heartfelt letter from the showrunners—written in character by Marge Simpson herself.

In the letter, Marge said she “always believed in her heart that we had a great deal in

common.” Rather than ignoring it, Mrs. Bush replied in her own hand: “How kind of you to write. I’m glad you spoke your mind,” Mrs. Bush said. “Clearly you are setting a good example for the rest of the country ... Please forgive a loose tongue.” Tulino reflected, “It was a private moment that showed her grace, wit, and, above all, her willingness to listen and take in other ideas—one stamped envelope at a time.”

President George W. Bush expressed his gratitude for the meaningful tribute to his mother. Bantering with the crowd, he shared stories of her humor, her love for books, and her deep kindness. “She knew family was vital to a happy life,” the former president said. “She was a lover of books. It was really important to her because she knew if a child couldn’t read, a child couldn’t succeed.”



Regarding the ceremony itself, he added, “Mother would put her stamp of approval on it.”

This event marked a memorable year celebrating the life of Barbara Bush, the warmth she extended to her fellow Americans, and the lasting stamp she left on our nation. ★

APRIL 16, 2025

Authors Diana B. Carlin, Anita B. McBride, and Nancy Kegan Smith visited the Annenberg Presidential Conference Center on April 16 to share insights from their book, *Remember the First Ladies: The Legacies of America’s History-Making Women*. A trailblazing initiative for the future of first lady research, the book delves into the integral role of first ladies across presidential history.



As Carlin told the audience, “You really can’t understand the arc of presidential history unless you understand the role of the women who were by their sides.” Joined by Dawn Hammatt, Director of the George H.W. Bush Presidential Library & Museum, who facilitated the panel, Carlin, McBride, and Smith offered insight into the changing role of first lady throughout presidential terms

Much of the conversation was spent reflecting on Mrs. Bush’s towering influence as a first lady. Describing her as George Bush’s “fiercest defender,” McBride spoke not only to Mrs. Bush’s role in supporting her husband’s political career, but her tenacious work to leave a legacy of her own.

Significantly, the panel

highlighted Barbara Bush’s bi-partisan efforts to pass the Literacy Act, a milestone showcasing her persistence behind the scenes. Perhaps even more touching was her compassionate approach to those often overlooked. A powerful picture of Mrs. Bush cradling Donovan, an infant diagnosed with AIDS, brought the nation one step closer to recognizing the dignity AIDS patients deserved. Smith noted, “Barbara Bush understood that the first lady can wield enormous power often with a single image and not saying a word. At the time, people thought that touching a person with the virus was dangerous and victims were shunned because of the stigma. Without saying a word, she made a political, and a human statement that was so important.”

McBride also noted the comfort Barbara Bush brought America as a wartime first lady, undoubtedly informed by her grace and diplomacy as a learned public speaker. On this topic Carlin added, “like we always say, [first ladies] humanize. They let you look at these people and at themselves as humans, who have families, who have imperfect children.”

Smith concluded the conversation with an excerpt from Betty Ford. “If the West Wing is the mind of the nation, then the East Wing is the heart.” This event perfectly captured the heart, levity, and fortitude that our first ladies so beautifully bring to the White House, an influence worth remembering. ★

On February 20, 2025, the annual Presidential Salute was proudly presented by the George & Barbara Bush Foundation at the stunning Post Oak Hotel in Uptown Houston. The event was a wonderful celebration, drawing more than 600 guests for an unforgettable evening of storytelling, reflection, and tribute to the long-lasting legacy of President and Mrs. Bush. Honoring President George H.W. Bush’s lifelong

commitment to selfless service, kindness, and civility, the Presidential Salute continues to inspire the leaders of tomorrow. The evening began with a moving musical performance by vocalist Elizabeth Russell Latham and pianist Anthony Bazzani, setting a patriotic

In a conversation moderated by Pierce Bush, President and Mrs. Bush’s grandson and the CEO of Big Brothers Big Sisters Lone Star, Nantz shared memories of his time spent in Maine and quiet moments when President Bush offered words of wisdom. He spoke of President Bush’s humility and kindness, calling him “the best American there has ever been.” Guests enjoyed a multi-course dinner inspired by White House menus from the Bush era, paired with wines from The Calling, the Sonoma vineyard co-founded by Jim Nantz and Peter Deutsch. Earlier in the evening, a silent auction drew guests in with Bush family memorabilia, including custom cowboy boots by Houston boot-maker Rocky Carroll, a Camp David themed package, and a Masters flag signed by Nantz. The evening concluded with an exciting live auction led by Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo auctioneer Randolph Holford. Featured items included: A Presidential

A thought-provoking panel and engaging conversation on “Why We Serve...Or Don’t?” was facilitated on October 15, 2024, at the stunning James A. Baker, III Pavilion at the George H.W. Bush Presidential



Center. Civil Dialogues is a special initiative in collaboration with the Clinton Presidential Center and the Lyndon Baines Johnson Library and Museum.

Opening remarks were given by Jean Becker, who invited the audience to reflect on the inspiration behind the event. She shared words written by former Texas House Speaker Joe Straus, who recalled a quote from President George H.W. Bush’s 1989 inaugural address: “I take as my guide the hope of a saint: in crucial things, unity; in important things, diversity; in all things, generosity.” Straus wrote, “We have been conditioned to think that the path to power is through dividing and conquering. In

contrast, President Bush built bipartisan coalitions around lasting achievements from the passage of the Americans with Disabilities Act to Operation Desert Storm.”

Linda Lorelle, Founder of Lorelle Media and former NBC News anchor, facilitated a panel featuring retired U.S. Air Force officer and accomplished fundraising executive, Dave Fujimoto, retired army officer and former local office candidate, Rob Altman, as well as Texas A&M students Gracie McMinn and Peyton McGuire. The panelists exchanged thoughts on running for public office, gaining constituent support, the role of political parties, and

encouraging civic duty.

Following the panel discussion, the night concluded with open dialogue at each table, leaving guests energized and inspired by the passion of the next generation of public servants.

As Becker shared, “The principles that President Bush promoted in so much of his life in and out of office are bigger than any one political party or ideology. Decency and goodness transcend any construct of conservative versus liberal.”

Civil Dialogues was a powerful evening that left all in attendance reflecting on how we each play a vital role in strengthening our democracy. ★

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Shaping the New Generation Through the Cameron Fellows Program

Most six-year-olds aren't brushing shoulders with congressmen, but for Peter Atherton, childhood looked quite different. As a grandson of Flora Cameron Crichton, renowned San Antonio philanthropist and influencer in the political sphere, Atherton was raised in a family where public service was the norm. With a deep sense of responsibility towards preserving Mrs. Crichton's legacy, Atherton helps honor his grandmother by guiding giving through the Flora Cameron Foundation.

around New England during his early campaign days,” Secretary Card recalls. “That time in the car—those conversations—taught me who he really was: brilliant, compassionate, selfless.” Those formative experiences led to a lifelong relationship with the Bush family, whom Card still considers close friends.

When the idea for a scholarship in Card’s name was proposed, it came not from him, but from those who had worked alongside him and admired his dedication to public service and to the Bush School of Government and Public Service at Texas A&M University. “I was humbled,” Card says. “I never saw myself as a great student. But the fact that people I respect wanted to honor me in this way—it means everything.”

The Andy Card Scholarship was established collaboratively by those who believe in Card’s legacy and in the mission of the Bush School: to educate principled leaders committed to public service. The scholarship ensures that financial burdens do not prevent future leaders from answering the call to serve—a mission close to both Card’s and President Bush’s hearts.

“Our graduates are the living legacy of President Bush,” Card emphasizes. “From diplomacy to the military, intelligence, local government, and beyond—they’re everywhere, making a difference. Supporting them through scholarships is the most powerful investment we can make in our country’s future.”

Preserving the Past, Giving to the Future

Most visitors to the George H.W. Bush Presidential Library would be surprised to learn that it began in an old bowling alley.

Before the stately building opened its doors, archivists with the National Archives and Records Administration—including Warren and Mary Finch—needed a place to store President Bush’s records while the library was under construction.

Starting in the early nineties, the Finches devoted most of their careers to preserving the legacy of President and Mrs. Bush at the George H.W. Bush Presidential Library & Museum. Warren was the first employee to arrive, named as director in December 1992, and Mary followed soon after—arriving on a C-5A transport plane from Fort Hood with records in tow. Significantly, this would only be the beginning of the couple’s long tenure in College Station. “I guess you would say the whole Finch family really was involved with the library,” Mary said, recalling their children growing up around the library.

With the Bush family so closely intertwined in their lives, Warren and Mary feel a deep responsibility to guard and promote the legacy of President Bush. Having both interacted with the Bush family and studied President Bush’s lifelong commitment to service, from his time in World War II to his work in business, Congress, the United Nations, the CIA, and ultimately the presidency, Warren

remembers a man firmly grounded in values. “If you research his life from beginning to end, you can see that what he stood for, he stood for his entire life.” Mary reflected. Warren highlighted a quote displayed on the wall of the Bush School of Government and Public Service, he added, “President Bush said, ‘There is no definition of successful life without service to others.’ And he lived that way.”

Out of gratitude for President and Mrs. Bush and their own experience working for the library,

the Finches generously contributed to the George & Barbara Bush Foundation’s Centennial Campaign. “I would encourage others to give to the foundation because it’s important to continue what the Bushes stood for,” Mary said.

Their three decades at the library embody that very mission. And their hope is simple: that others will carry it forward. “President and Mrs. Bush meant a lot to this community, to this state, to this

country,” Mary shared. “And we think everyone should help continue that legacy.” ★
